

Apply Now for 2021 Property Tax and Rent Rebate

Eligible Pennsylvania residents are reminded to apply to the Property Tax/Rent Rebate Program to claim rebates on property taxes or rent paid during 2021. Remember – you do not need to pay anyone for assistance to apply for the rebates. Help is available from my district office at no charge, but appointments are necessary. Please call 610-965-9933 to schedule a time when my staff can assist you with the application. Our office is located in the Lower Macungie Township Administration Building at 3402 Brookside Road.

The rebate program benefits eligible residents age 65 and older; widows and widowers age 50 and older; and people with disabilities age 18 and older. The income limit is \$35,000 a year for homeowners and \$15,000 annually for renters, and half of Social Security income is excluded.

The maximum standard rebate is \$650, but supplemental rebates for certain qualifying homeowners can boost rebates to \$975. The Revenue Department automatically calculates supplemental rebates for qualifying homeowners.

The deadline to apply for a rebate is June 30. Rebates will be distributed beginning July 1, as required by law. Additional information, as well as claim forms, can be found on the Department of Revenue website, www.revenue.pa.gov.

Since the program's inception in 1971, older adults and those with disabilities have received more than \$7.1 billion in property tax and rent relief. The program is funded by the Pennsylvania Lottery and revenue from slots gaming.

RECYCLING Do's & Don'ts

Commonly Accepted & Unacceptable Material

While not all inclusive, below are some of the most common items to keep in and out of the recycling bin.

Materials That Cause Problems

The most common materials that cause problems include plastic bags, plastic film, garden hoses, and wiring. Never include any material that may bind or restrict recycling sorting machinery. Sortation lines are routinely shut down due to the inclusion of these materials, which must be manually removed and disposed of by workers.

Never include any potentially hazardous material in your curbside bin. Examples are propane tanks, broken glass, needles, etc. In addition to contributing to contamination in the recycling stream, these materials are dangerous to the haulers and workers handling this material.

Include:

- Plastic bottles and containers
- Cardboard and paperboard
- · Aluminum, tin and steel cans
- Magazines and newspaper
- · Glass bottles and containers

Do Not Include:

- · Plastic bags or plastic films
- · Recyclables in plastic bags
- · Any soiled/wet/greasy material
- · Food waste
- · Disposable polystyrene containers
- · Broken glass
- · Ceramics, crystal, and leaded glass
- Plastic toys, bins, bulk items
- Propane tanks

WHAT IS AN MS4 AND WHY SHOULD I CARE?

Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System refers to a collection of structures designed to gather stormwater and discharge it into local streams and rivers. MS4 is short for, "Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System", where the word "Municipal" refers to a unit of local government like a borough or a township, but may also refer to an organization responsible for the administration of a developed area. And the number 4 refers to the four words that start with the letter "S"; "Separate," "Storm," "Sewer," "System."

Whether you live in a town, the country, a city, or the suburbs – when it rains, the water that runs off needs somewhere to go. Stormwater affects everyone! We are all part of a watershed. Watersheds are land areas that drain to the nearest body of water. For example, if you are in western Pennsylvania, you are part of the Ohio River watershed, while eastern Pennsylvania lands may ultimately drain to the Chesapeake Bay. Smaller local creeks and streams also eventually drain to a larger local water body. Stormwater issues can lead to many issues and restrictions including flooding, pollution and health impacts, streambank erosion, sedimentation, impacts to groundwater recharge, and impacts to recreational opportunities.

Making changes to how stormwater is managed can go a long way to reduce negative impacts. Even small actions by individual homeowners, like using a rain barrel, choosing permeable landscaping surfaces, or installing a rain garden, can make a difference. Stormwater affects everyone!
